# National Pub of the Year

**The Bailey Head (pictured) in Oswestry, Shropshire is CAMRA's National Pub of the Year, topping a remarkable rags-to-riches success story after the owners turned what was once a closed local into a haven for the community.**

The Bailey Head had been failing under the ownership of a major pub company & was listed by CAMRA as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) to protect it from redevelopment. Nine years ago, it was bought by Duncan Borrowman and Grace Goodlad who poured their knowledge & passion into transforming the pub.

Community & inclusion are at the heart of the pub, and it acts as a hub for locals to come together for good causes through events like its charity pub quizzes and live music.

Their dedication means that the Bailey Head has won a staggering roster of awards from CAMRA, the Society of Independent Brewers and Associates (SIBA), The Shropshire GOAT & TripAdvisor.

Duncan said: "We have always had a policy of everyone welcome, any person should feel happy and comfortable coming in by themselves and enjoying a drink, either on their own or chatting to other customers. We thrive on being the heart of the community and a place where people gather to celebrate or commiserate. Aside from providing a welcoming atmosphere, the Bailey Head also boasts an impressive array of cask beer and cider."

Grace said: "We are thrilled, we hope



we can live up to the award. In our wildest dreams we never thought we would win CAMRA Pub of the Year. From small beginnings nine years ago, we have taken everything one step at a time, through Covid, slowly improving to the point where we now have 12 handpulls serving six cask beers and six ciders and perries, plus 16 other draught lines.

"When we bought the pub nine years ago it was failing and had been listed as an Asset of Community Value by the local CAMRA branch. That listing made it possible for us to save it from potentially becoming housing and turning it into the pub it is today."

# Get involved: Beer Scoring

Ever wondered why your favourite pub isn't in The Good Beer Guide?, or thought why on earth have they included that pub?

The National Beer Scoring System (NBSS) is a 0-5 point scale for judging beer quality in pubs. All CAMRA members can score their beers which will help CAMRA monitor beer quality in pubs and clubs across the UK. CAMRA branches use these scores to help them determine which pubs from their area to include in The Good Beer Guide. NBSS is an easy to use system that has been designed to enable all CAMRA members from any part of the world to report beer quality on any pub in the UK.

In order to submit your scores, you can login to CAMRA's online pub guide [whatpub.com](http://whatpub.com) or the CAMRA website and search for the pub you are scoring. Half points can be used if your opinion of the beer falls between two of the categories.

Remember you are scoring the beer quality NOT if it is your favourite style. The more beer scores there are, the better understanding the branch will have when selecting entries for the Good Beer Guide.



**0: No cask ale available**

*This can be because the pub never has it or it's run out*



**1: Poor**

*Beer that is anything from barely drinkable to drinkable with considerable resentment*



**2: Average**

*Competently kept, drinkable pint but doesn't inspire in anyway, not worth moving to another pub but you drink the beer without really noticing*



**3: Good**

*Good beer in good form. You may cancel plans to move to the next pub. You want to stay for another pint and may seek out the beer again*



**4: Excellent**

*Good Excellent beer in excellent condition*



**5: Perfect**

*Probably the best you are ever likely to find.*

*A seasoned drinker will award this score **very rarely***

# 50 years ago

## Paul Mudge recalls the second year of CAMRA in Stafford and Stone

With an Inaugural Meeting in July, a "Firkin Festival" and the Stone Joules Wake in October, the Stafford and Stone Branch of CAMRA had got off to a good start during 1974.

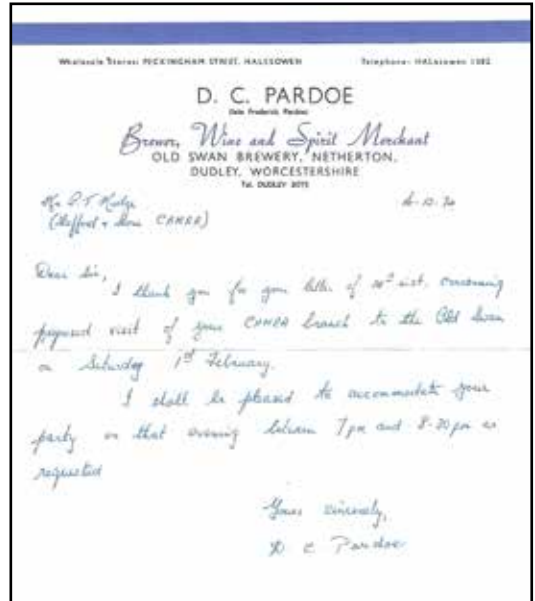
The year ended well with a Christmas Party on Thursday 19th December in Stone's Red Lion with enthusiastic proprietor Frank Beech ensuring a great evening of "Live music, Bran Tub, Educational Cellar Visits and Real Exotic Food".

Surveying for the first Stafford and Stone District Pub Guide had been completed with details being finalised during early 1975.

Stafford and Stone Branch were also "involved in discussions with other Midland branches over the proposed creation of a regional committee, consisting of representatives from each branch. The idea is that this should replace the (overworked) Regional Organiser, co-ordinate CAMRA activities in the Midlands & give us more say in the affairs of the National Executive than we have at present."

The Branch's Black Country Coach Trip, with tickets at 60p, on Saturday 1st February 1975 was for "Mrs. Pardoes (homebrew), Bathams, Simp-kiss, Holdens." Telephones weren't used much then and hand written letters such as the one pictured from Doris Pardoe about her Old Swan being one of the surviving 4 pubs being the

norm. The other 3 being the Lamp Tavern (Batham's), Jolly Crispin (Simpkiss - brewery closed in 1985) and Park Inn (Holden's).



"More Choice of Ale" was good news locally by the spring of 1975. Stafford's "Railway now serves real Ansell's Mild", or did for a while alongside the Bitter, while "the Red Lion, Stone keeps draught Bass - the only choice in Stone" with Joules Bitter, by then from Burton, the only cask beer in all of the town's other pubs.

"Thursday Night is CAMRA Night" had been decided the previous autumn and members regularly met then at Stafford's Railway Inn, the well-established "Branch HQ" with a vital notice board top right of the Public Bar's fireplace. *continued...*

A coach trip, again 60p, took many Stafford and Stone Branch members from the Railway at 7pm on Thursday 6th March to a Games Night against South Manchester Branch. This was at the Gateway ( now a Wetherspoons ) beside the A34 in Didsbury with "*Hydes Ales, Darts, Crib, Dominoes, Tiddlywinks*". The coach stopped on the return journey in Heaton Mersey for Boddingtons at the Dog and Partridge and Holts at the Griffin.

Another "*one-night beer exhibition*" or "*Super Firkin Night*" was held on Saturday 15th March at the Students Union Building in Stafford's Tipping Street for "*CAMRA branch members & NUS members only*" although "*Doors close when 300 are inside*". Allowing for just over 3½ pints each, the fifteen firkins were three Old Ales (Theakston's Old Peculiar, Marstons Owd Rodger, Wadworth's Old Timer), six Bitters, two Milds (Banks's, Wem) and four "*Southern Delights*" including Fullers ESB.

CAMRA's 1975 Good Beer Guide, the second proper one, was published on 17th March with "*65p through the branch*" knocking 10p off the cover price. Stafford and Stone Branch accounted for 29 of the 92 Staffordshire pubs which covered five of the 176 pages for a total of 2700 pubs.

The first Annual General Meeting was held on Thursday 1st May.

(All nine pubs mentioned have survived the past fifty years).

# INDIE BEER

The **INDIE BEER** campaign, launched by the Society of Independent Brewers (SIBA) and associates, aims to make the **INDIE BEER** mark the recognisable standard for high quality craft and cask beer, brewed across the UK, by truly independent breweries.

To be considered as independent by SIBA a brewery must;

**a)** Be a manufacturer of beer and have their own Brewing Equipment, or be an independent beer brand brewed and packaged at a qualifying brewery. Beer produced for commercial sale up to a maximum permitted production volume of 1% of the British Beer mar-

ket (as defined by industry statistics in respect of the previous calendar year);

**b)** Be a UK based sole trader, partnership, limited liability partnership or limited company that is permanently based in the UK and carries out a minimum of 75% of its total beer production in the UK. For these purposes the UK shall include the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man;

**c)** Not be under the control of or connected with any other entity operating within the UK brewing industry (as defined by the Corporation Tax Act 2010) except where as a result of such control or connection the combined entity does not contravene a) above.

CAMRA is supporting the campaign, which is designed to help consumers.

CAMRA Chairman, Ash Corbett-Collins, said: "CAMRA is delighted to be supporting SIBA's **INDIE BEER** campaign. We know that finding independent and local beer is often a top priority for our members and beer drinkers across the UK. It's great that SIBA are committed to transparent communication about ownership

in beer.

"Unfortunately, we often see global brewers market their own brands as if they were independent, tricking consumers in the process. It is vital that consumers have access to the right information about where their beer is being brewed, and whether it's in independent ownership."

The **INDIE BEER** campaign includes a 'brewery checker' so that consumers can find out if a brewer is independently owned, and an 'assured' mark for brewers to use to show their independence.

After our trips aboard the 101 bus, we were thinking of setting off again when, quite suddenly, fortune knocked in the form of a money-off voucher for the Woolpack at Weston – a sign, if ever there was one! What better motivation to get your shoes on than the promise of a discount and some decent grub? This time, we took the 841 to Uttoxeter. Being close by, we hopped on at the county hospital and rode straight to Weston, where, as it happens, there's only one stop: the old school. You can't miss it.

Naturally, while we were there, we felt it our duty to visit both pubs in town, so we took a little stroll down the main road toward the Saracens Head.



The place was quite busy but not overly crowded, and as we waited behind a gentleman at the bar, one of the staff came over and asked if we were planning to eat. We explained we were just after a drink, to which she told us that she didn't think there were any tables available.

After a quick scan she returned, confirming that, no, there were indeed no tables. But, and here's where it got odd, she then offered us the chance to sit down anyway. We did but feeling a little uncomfortable we left and walked back to the Woolpack.



Now, the Woolpack holds a special place for me, being an old haunt of sorts. My brother and his wife used to live in the village and I also spent a fair bit of time there fishing. So, entering the Woolpack felt like stepping into familiar territory. I ordered a pint of Banks' Amber, which was exactly what the doctor ordered, followed by a pint of Pedigree, which was also good. The pub itself is a cracking spot for a Friday afternoon pint, and I imagine it's even better in the summer when the beer garden beckons.

As for the food, I opted for the steak and ale pie, while Hilly went for the lasagna. Both dishes were extremely nice, served by genuinely friendly staff. And I must say good value for money even without the money off voucher.

I even managed a nice chat with the landlady while taking advantage of doing a pub survey for WhatPub.

Another good thing about the Woolpack is that it's open in the afternoon when the buses are still running, which by the way are almost hourly, but the route does vary during the day so you really must check where you can get on and off.

I'll certainly give the Saracens Head another shot on one of our return trips, but for now, the Woolpack remains a solid choice. So, to all you bus pass holders, get out there and make good use of them.

And would you believe it? Just the other day, Marston's sent me a money-off voucher. Guess where I'm headed this Friday.

Many pub names have links with events from the past or personalities of national and local importance, and the Society provides a forum for members to research the history of inns and pub names.

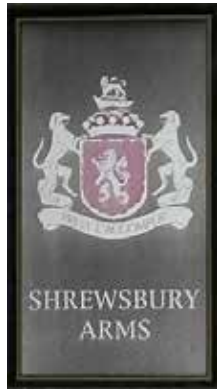
It has an active web site and a quarterly full-colour journal to which members are encouraged to submit articles, pictures of pub signs and news from their areas.

As inns and pubs close at an alarming rate, much local heritage is in danger of being lost forever. Pubs are not just a place to enjoy a drink, they are often at the heart of the community and can reflect its history.

Many members take a general interest in all signs, with some specialising in particular breweries, counties, aircraft or railways, to name but a few.



The local Midlands Group meets three or four times a year at the Mare & Colt, near Kidderminster, to enjoy a lunch followed by a slide-show of pub signs.



The Inn Sign Society is seeking to recruit more members and bring in new blood to help continue the good work done over the last 32 years.

# National Club of the Year

**The Firs Club in Codsall, Staffordshire, is CAMRA's Club of the Year 2024, finally taking the national crown after winning the West Midlands regional title three years in a row .**

The multi-award-winning social club is a must-visit for cask beer fans, with a microbrewery on-site which features in its November festival, a highlight in the local beer calendar.

As well as Firs beers, the bar offers five locally sourced ever-changing cask ales, usually including one mild. In the comfortably furnished club, guests can enjoy a pint in the bar, relax in the quiet lounge, play pool and darts in the separate sports areas or play snooker upstairs.

The club hosts many events for the local community and provides a welcoming space for private events including weddings, parties and functions as a meeting space for groups.

Club of the Year coordinator Phil Gregg said: "The 2024 competition



was extremely close fought. Each of our finalists were of an extremely high standard, and it made the judging harder than ever! We're delighted to be announcing a first-time winner, and the Firs Club epitomises what's great about UK venues like these, and how important they are to their local communities."

Club manager Anna Reynolds said: "Well what can I say, it's a great

surprise and honour to win CAMRA's Club of the Year award, it's something we thought was out of our reach. We couldn't have done it without the support of our club members, committee, CAMRA members and, of course, the staff who work hard to make the club a great place to visit and hopefully stay for a while."
